MEDIA PREVIEW: CALGARY SISTERS FOLLOW UP FOOTPRINTS PROJECT WITH REMOUNT OF MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN ART INSTALLATION AT ERNEST MANNING HIGH SCHOOL

CALGARY – October 24, 2016: Calgary sisters Kaiya and Aiyana Leonard La Couvée are available to media today at Ernest Manning High School as they prepare to remount their recent successful art installation of more than 1,200 pairs of shoes in honor of the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women at Olympic Plaza in downtown Calgary on Oct. 4.

The art installation, titled [The Footprints Project](#), attracted widespread attention across Canada, including teachers at Ernest Manning High School (where Kaiya is a Grade 10 student), who invited the Leonard La Couvée sisters to remount and present their project to students at the school.

The art display will be installed today at 3:30 p.m. in preparation for a school-wide unveiling tomorrow – open to students and staff only.

The sisters' project also captured the attention of the [WE Day](#) organizers, resulting in their invitation to speak at the upcoming event at the Calgary Saddledome, on Wednesday, Oct. 26.

Due to significant media interest in [The Footprints Project](#) in recent weeks, the Leonard La Couvée sisters will make themselves available at today's installation and media preview.
